What is a Pathways Program?

Pathways programs offer comprehensive support for pre-college musicians from historically underrepresented backgrounds. The earliest Pathways programs have existed for over 30 years, while new programs continue to emerge across the country. These programs come in many shapes and sizes, but there are key elements that are embedded within each program.


Equity Arc unites these programs through the National Collective for Musical Pathways and completed the first-ever Pathways Census with the 12 member programs that joined in the 2022-23 school year. This report shares an overview of Pathways programs, common themes shared between programs, and considerations for existing and prospective Pathways administrators to reflect upon.

Program Components

The program components list was based on a survey that was shared with members of the Collective. We asked each program to share the level of support provided in the following areas:

- College Audition Preparation
- Ensemble Training
- Instrument Access and Funding
- Mental Health and Wellness
- Mentorship and Professional Development
- Music History and Theory
- Performance Opportunities
- Travel Assistance
- Tuition Assistance

Here are the findings:



Key Takeaways:

College Audition Preparation: All programs ensure fellows are prepped to be extremely competitive for collegiate music study. This preparation includes mock auditions, college prep courses, consultation with families, financial support for pre-screening recordings, and covering fees for travel to auditions.

Ensemble Training: Most programs include chamber music and large ensemble training as part of a Pathways fellow's development. This is offered either through an in-house program or with local partner programs.

Instrument Access and Funding: Nearly all programs provide resources for Pathways fellows to access an instrument. Most offer funding that helps students purchase an instrument while others have instruments available for loan.

Mental Health and Wellness: Psychological and behavioral preparation is a key area of support needed for classical musicians to thrive. Five out of 12 Pathways programs offer mental health and wellness support for students, some on an as-needed basis and others embed the topic into programming.

Mentorship and Professional Development: These offerings are individualized based on the

program and student needs. It can include regular advisory meetings with program managers and families, mentor meetings, and engagement with guest artists and faculty.

Music History and Theory: These classes are offered by most Pathways programs to equip students with a foundational understanding of classical music.

Performance Opportunities: All Pathways programs ensure students have performance opportunities through recitals, juries, and masterclasses.

Tuition Assistance: This includes assistance with private lessons, summer study, and youth orchestra ensembles. Each program prioritizes private music study with an experienced music professional.

Travel Assistance: This primarily includes travel for college auditions, summer music study, and Equity Arc's National Pathways Festival Orchestra. Funding for travel is often provided on an asneeded basis while some programs offer a travel stipend for high school students.

Student Expectations

With a significant amount of resources offered by Pathways programs, we asked what is expected from students in Pathways programs.

Based on responses from the Census, Pathways fellows are expected to:

- · Attend events, recitals, and concerts and write reports on experience
- Perform in juries, recitals, and mock auditions
- Practice regularly and attend weekly private lessons
- Attend summer music programs
- Commit to the program and its mission, for some this includes majoring in music in college

Family Engagement

We found that Pathways fellows spend an average of 4 hours per week in Pathways-related programming, in addition to individual practice, ensemble playing, and private lessons. This is not just a commitment for the musicians, but also their families. We asked how Pathways programs engage with families to make sure they are equipped to support their musicians' journey.

Family engagement in Pathways includes:

- · Regular meetings with families, offering individualized advising as needed
- One-on-one advisory meetings to discuss the fellow's progress in Pathways programs
- · Community gatherings for Pathways families to connect with each other

In addition to those engagements, one Pathways program has a mentor program that works with both students and families. Another program has parental council members on the Board of Directors.

The Cost of Pathways

Although the above resources are offered at little to no cost to Pathways fellows, Pathways programs cost a significant amount to operate effectively.

Here is a snapshot of what it costs to run a Pathways program:

- The average operating budget of Pathways programs is \$497,398.79, the highest budget is \$921,690 and the lowest budget is \$104,535.
- The **top five expenses** of Pathways programs (excluding staff) are:
 - Private lessons
 - Tuition for ensemble, summer study, and school-year programming
 - Instruments, Music Equipment, and Repairs
 - External contractors (guest artists, accompanists, clinicians, consultants)
 - Travel for summer programs, college auditions, and the National Pathways Festival
- It costs an average of \$9,478.70 to support one Pathways fellow per school year.

Accomplishments of the National Collective for Musical Pathways

In the fall of 2022, Equity Arc launched the National Collective for Musical Pathways, an alliance of rigorous pre-college music training programs committed to removing barriers and accelerating the progress of BIPOC musicians. This was a culmination of roundtable conversations at the 2022 Youth in Music Summit in Chicago.


This diverse group of programs across the nation creates opportunities to share insights, learn from each other, and develop collective initiatives to advance equity in classical music.

Initiatives & Achievements

- **Funding:** Over the past decade, the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation supported the launch of a number of pre-college pathways programs across the United States. After that funding cycle ended, the Paul M. Angell Family Foundation stepped in to create a special funding stream for Pathways Programs, providing a total of \$1.8 million in multi-year operating support for 8 Collective members—championing the sustainability of Pathways programs.
- National Pathways Festival: 40 musicians from Pathways programs across the country traveled to Cincinnati to perform in the inaugural National Pathways Festival Orchestra. This transformative experience included opportunities to play side-by-side with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra under the leadership of Maestro Kevin John Edusei, perform mock auditions for distinguished collegiate faculty, and connect with peers from similar cultural backgrounds.



PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Accelerando provides a range of support and opportunities for their fellows. They provide financial support in the shape of instrument loans, summer festival funding, college application and audition travel support, instrument supplies and musical materials, travel and transportation support, and much more. They also provide experienced mentorship for their students as they develop through the program. This mentorship includes topics like scheduling, planning, college, financial aid, and essentially any need that is identified among their students. Finally, Accelerando offers a rich season of programming for their students that engages them and helps them make connections throughout the field. This programming includes theory and youth orchestra opportunities for their growth.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

CMPI offers ongoing musical evaluation and feedback through semiannual juries and advisories, as well as financial support towards expenses associated with musical training—including instrument purchases, private lessons, summer camp tuition, and college applications. They offer a network of supportive adults—private teachers, student navigators and mentors—who work together to ensure that the student and their parents/caregivers have the support and knowledge necessary to progress in their musical training. CMPI provides performance opportunities in the form of monthly recitals, as well as exposure to information about the field of classical music in the form of monthly community meetings, career workshops, and masterclasses with guest artists and lecturers.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

PMAY supports 5th-12th graders from communities that are historically excluded on the symphony orchestra stage and those who encounter hardships to realize their musical potential and ultimately pursue their dreams of becoming professional classical musicians. The PMAY Artists' Initiative offers students financial support to make lessons, music classes, youth orchestra participation, and summer music camps affordable. Students will be able to attend free college and career preparation workshops, and PMAY teachers and staff will work with each family to make sure each musician has a strong plan to be accepted into a music conservatory, college or university music school majoring in music.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Washington Musical Pathways Initiative is a talent development program for musicians in grades 8-12 from communities that have been historically excluded from classical music and want to pursue advanced studies in music. WMPI provides comprehensive musical support, including full scholarships for weekly private lessons and participation in the DC Youth Orchestra Program, funding for instruments, financial support for summer music opportunities, mentorship, workshops in college and career preparation, and more unique opportunities for dedicated young musicians on their personal musical journeys.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

YOSA Rising Star Fellows offers mentoring and resources to young musicians of color, maximizing their musical potential and preparing them for placement in top university music schools and conservatories. In addition to financial assistance for youth orchestra tuition, summer camps, and private lessons, fellows also receive ongoing career/college advisement, access to masterclasses and workshops, ticket discounts for local concerts, and performance opportunities.

Considerations for the Field

- Certain pathways programs have dedicated staff assigned whose full-time role is
 administrating the program. Programs that do not have this full-time staff have less of a
 capacity for the individualized attention that sets these programs apart, and in turn, these
 programs can offer fewer services and programming.
- Program size varies depending on several factors including sustainability of funding, staff capacity, and infrastructure.
- More established Pathways programs, (for example, Atlanta Symphony Orchestra's Talent Development Program) have graduated alumni whose careers are actively having an impact on the field of classical music. This further proves the efficacy of Pathways work and bodes well for future classes graduating each year, and transferring to high education institutions. In addition to enjoying successful and vibrant performing careers, many alumni of pathways programs are shaping the field through designing and administering new programs and organizations that build equity and meaningful representation.
- Pathways programs primarily serve students in middle and high school, however, some are
 expanding to educate students earlier in their studies. There is a consensus that starting
 students in Pathways programs earlier in their education is a positive choice, and will
 allow more time for musical and extramusical skills to develop more fully by high school
 graduation.
- Pathways programs benefit from being integrated within their home institutions. Programs with institutional support, and aligned institutional values (i.e. mission and vision statements) have more access to funding and can efficiently serve more families.
- Partnerships with local music programs, educational institutions, and other community partners help to grow programming and expand resources for students and families.
- There is consensus that mental health is a primary concern for Pathways stakeholders across
 the arc. While programs have engaged experts through programming and offered other
 external services, there is a recognition that mental health supports are a potential area for
 growth.
- Concerning recruitment, the programs have commonly identified potential fellows in four ways; feeder and partner music programs, public school partnerships, word of mouth with community members, and social media or email communications.
